100: Building Public Health Leadership to Advance Health Equity
Presented By: National Collaborating Centre for Determinants of Health
Cost: \$99 per person + HST

The purpose of this workshop is to advance public health leadership for health equity within community/public health nursing. The session will interest leaders at all levels including practitioners, middle and senior managers, program decision-makers, educators, researchers, policy-makers, and funders.

Background

Leadership emerged as an important factor in effectively advancing health equity in the National Collaborating Centre for Determinants of Health (NCCDH) environmental scan in 2010. However, the scan revealed little consensus about leadership enabling factors and preliminary consultation suggested that leadership development needs are divergent.

The NCCDH is implementing a Public Health Leadership Development Initiative to influence effective public health leadership by individuals and organizations to address determinants of health and advance health equity. Over the long term, it is anticipated that public health accountability mechanisms will be strengthened through the contribution of the NCCDH Public Health Leadership Initiative.

In this workshop the NCCDH will report results of the first steps of the Public Health Leadership Development Initiative including:

- Evidence and expert opinion about leaders/organizations which are achieving health equity outcomes through public health action
- Enabling factors; provincial/territorial differences; and opportunities/challenges that are being or could be addressed
- Options regarding public health leadership development strategies and tools

Workshop participants will:

- Exchange knowledge about leadership at the frontline, management, and executive levels within organizations
- Evaluate enabling factors identified in the environmental scan, the preliminary findings in the literature review and early consultations
- Generate options for community and public health nurses to implement strategies that demonstrate leadership in advancing health equity
- Identify actions for adopting a health equity framework in individual and organizational practice
- Learn about and engage with the new NCCDH Learning Network for practitioners to advance health equity

101: Methods and Tools to Support the Use of Evidence in Nursing Practice

Presented By: National Collaborating Centre for Methods and Tools

Cost: \$70 per person + HST

There has been considerable emphasis on using research evidence in nursing to strengthen nursing practice and improve health outcomes. Previous pre-conference workshops have focused on evidence-informed practice by introducing a seven step process: Define, Search, Appraise, Synthesize, Adapt, Implement, Evaluate, and organizational change to support the use of evidence in nursing practice. This preconference workshop will focus on methods and tools specific to each step in the process of evidence-informed practice. Methods and tools are resources that provide an organizing approach (method) and specific steps (tool) that can be used to support evidence-informed practice. By linking methods and tools to each step of the process, participants will gain knowledge of how to implement evidence-informed practice in their work and/or organization in a systematic, comprehensive manner. An overview of the steps of evidence-informed practice will be provided along with case examples, user stories and methods and tools for each step. The workshop will combine large and small group discussion and will be relevant to all community health settings, such as home health care, primary care and public health. Workshop participants will be provided with methods and tools that support each step.

At the conclusion of this workshop, participants will be able to:

- Articulate how the steps of evidence-informed practice are relevant to one's work and/or organization
 - Identify methods and tools to support each step of evidence-informed practice
 - Identify next steps or implications for practice
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102: Addressing Chronic Diseases: A Social Determinants of Health Focus

Presented By: Canadian Nurses Association and Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario

Cost: \$70 per person + HST

Chronic disease continues to be a critical focus in public health in Canada and globally. Chronic diseases, such as heart disease, stroke, cancer, chronic respiratory diseases and diabetes, are by far the leading cause of mortality in the world, representing 63% of all deaths. Out of the 36 million people who died from chronic disease in 2008, nine million were under 60 and ninety per cent of these premature deaths occurred in low- and middle-income countries. While the overall health of Canada's population is considered very well, especially in comparison to many other countries, the management and prevention of chronic diseases in Canada represents the biggest challenge to our health care system. Canadians are at greater risk of heart disease, obesity, high blood pressure, osteoporosis, diabetes, cancer and depression.

Registered nurses and nurse practitioners have the highest proportion of direct interaction with Canadians of any health-care providers who work with Canadians to prevent and manage chronic illnesses and who play an integral role in all aspects of health promotion and disease prevention.

Poverty, lack of education, unaffordable housing and environmental contaminants all make it difficult for people to stay healthy and profoundly affect their life choices, especially among those in communities with little or no infrastructure or social supports. Living in these conditions can severely affect mental health and lead to chronic illness. The evidence clearly shows that Canadians who live in poverty are less healthy and die earlier than those who are better off (CNA, 2010).

Recognizing that risk factors for chronic disease also lie outside the realm of the health sector, means alleviating poverty, providing basic health education, improved food security, housing and employment conditions, protecting the environment and ensuring gender equity are necessary interventions. Culturally competent and sensitive care also stands to lead to better health outcomes among immigrant, refugee and other marginalized populations (Thomas et al., 2007).

This interactive workshop will explore:

- Epidemiology of chronic diseases in Canada
- Economic costs
- Proximal risk factors
- Distal risk factors
- Role of nurses in addressing social determinants of health as distal risk factors to chronic disease

201: Housing and Health: How can Community Health Nurses intervene?
Presented By: National Collaborating Centre on Environmental Health
Cost: \$70 per person + HST

The purpose of this workshop is to provide an overview of the associations between inadequate housing and adverse health effects and to discuss ways that community health nurses can intervene. Inadequate or poor housing is often used as a proxy for low socioeconomic status which is an established risk factor for poor health status. However in this workshop, we will explore the question of whether housing itself is a factor for health effects. Does it matter where you live?

Various ways in which poor housing adversely impacts health status will be presented. Poorly built or maintained homes can lead to direct impacts on health by increasing exposure to agents (e.g. mould, pests, and radon), or contributing to conditions that result in increased susceptibility to or transmission of disease (e.g. increased transmission of TB due to overcrowding). Inadequate plumbing results in

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limited access to safe drinking water and an inability to practice hand hygiene. Aging plumbing lines can cause plumbing leaks (leading to mould problems) or leaching of lead and other metals into drinking water. Inadequately ventilated woodstoves or fireplaces result in indoor wood smoke exposure. Not only can overcrowding and poor air circulation lead to increased transmission of infectious diseases, these conditions can result in increased relative humidity leading to mould problems. Exposure to contaminants (eg. mould or smoke) or certain conditions (e.g., damp and cold) may also result in increased susceptibility to respiratory and infectious diseases.

Through interactive discussion participants will explore specific housing situations and their health impacts on vulnerable populations (e.g. children, seniors, urban, rural and remote communities). Further, participants will share examples of how community health nurses currently get involved in housing issues, and explore together other possibilities for intervention. The session will consist of a presentation as well as small and large group discussions.

202: Community Health Nursing: Moving Standards, Certification and Practice Model Forward
Presented By: The Community Health Nurses of Canada's (CHNC) Professional Development and Education Standing Committee and the Certification, Standards, Competencies Standing Committee
Cost: \$70 per person + HST

The Canadian Nurses Association (CNA) Community Health Nursing certification competencies and the Canadian Community Health Nursing Standards of Practice have been updated in 2011 to reflect current community health nursing practice in Canada. In addition a New Community Health Nursing Professional Practice Model has been developed. These structures are integral to defining the unique practice of community health nursing and the advancement of community health nursing as a Canadian Nursing specialty. The Community Health Nurses of Canada's (CHNC) Professional Development and Education Standing Committee and the Certification, Standards, Competencies Standing Committee are collaborating to offer this interactive workshop to help you understand and integrate the Community Health Nursing Professional Practice Model and the Canadian Community Health Nursing Standards of Practice into your practice and workplaces. Additionally, this workshop will introduce a new Study Guide developed for the 2012 CNA Community Health Nursing Certification Exam and will present strategies that effectively support nurses in their preparation for certification. Participants will exchange knowledge of best and promising strategies for using these resources and tools that promote excellence in community health nursing clinical practice and nursing education. Participants will receive a slide deck for oral presentations and information handouts that can be used for staff orientation and professional development opportunities.

203: Building Leadership Capacity of Nurses Coming into Home Health Care
Presented By: OHCA/OCSA Nursing Practice Council
No Cost

Purpose of the Pre-Conference: To share the refreshed online modules and more importantly engage in consultation with participants to:

1. Identify mechanisms to increase the spread of this tool and leverage all aspects of the tool,
2. Explore important research questions related to learning, leadership development and home care and identify some mechanisms for funding research of this nature,
3. Identify key topic areas for future modules that would benefit home health care nurses across Canada and identify any partnerships that may be explored in creation of those additional modules

Background: In 2006 the Minister of Health in Ontario created a strategy to ensure all graduate nurses would be able to access full time employment. In addition, with an increase in demand for homecare,

health human resource shortage, the decentralized nature of the work and increasing client acuity and complexity barriers to successful achievement of the provincial goal were identified. Working in a decentralized environment with a high level of autonomy requires all nurses to develop proficiency in leadership competencies. Feedback from the home health care sector indicated that there was a limited opportunity, in the nursing curriculum, for new graduates to build their leadership capacity. In addition, new graduates perceived the transition into practice as difficult. The need to develop an accessible leadership development program for these new nurses coming to home care was identified as one solution to the issue.

Methods: Two associations, Ontario Home Care Association and Ontario Community Support Association, with accountabilities for home health care in Ontario, collaborated together to respond to a call for RFP's by the Nursing Secretariat to develop an online "Nursing Leadership Resource". Together the associations created an advisory team to create the proposal, select the project team and to support the development of a resource. That advisory team has continued to inform the utilization of the resource, guide the recent refresh and support the sustainability of the resource.

Findings: An online format was selected with focus on three key areas of leadership: communication skills and conflict resolution, advanced facilitation skills, and systems thinking and advocacy. In addition, a knowledge library was created and a community of practice established to support continued growth and conversation. A formal literature search, environmental scan and comprehensive evaluation framework guided the work

Conclusion: This project builds capacity of nurses coming into home health care and develops key leadership skills, strengthens clinical competence, builds confidence and empowers nurses. In addition, it is expected that the initiative will potentially increase the uptake of new graduates into the home health care sector. Nurses, administrators, educators and researchers will all find this presentation relevant.
