Why develop a Wound Care Course for First Nations?

- Home care is a recent phenomenon in First Nation communities
- Community wound management is complex
- Challenges in resource access in First Nation communities

What nurses said they wanted:

"More education that will allow us as health care providers to actually have that capability to change the dressings as needed without sending our clients to the local hospitals as walk-ins or thru emerg."





The Aims of the Wound Management Course

- To increase the knowledge of Best Practice Wound Management in First Nations communities
- "Implications for Practice" = Knowledge to Practice
- Practice to Prevention of adverse outcomes
- Increase in quality of life of First Nation peoples





The Challenges to Delivering Education

- 100's of rural and remote First Nation communities
- Staffing challenges
- Vast Geography
- Frequent Isolation
- Costs of Travel to attend education
- Time away from home





The Pathway to Education Delivery

- Saint Elizabeth Health Care @YourSide Colleague®
 - Online professional development site
 - Various courses (Diabetes, Cancer Care etc)
 - National/International access (FNI, Trinidad/Tobago, SEHC)
- Synchronous/asynchronous study groups
 - Increase engagement/comfort with independent study
 - Relate to subject matter within learning site





The Wound Management Course

- 7 live, interactive sessions of 1 hour each
- Web-based delivery
- Learner's choice session
- Subject matter expert delivery and available for clinical issues
- 6 independent reflective practice modules on @YourSide Colleague® (asynchronous learning)

Creating Relevant Content

- Use of case studies to promote story-telling and sharing of wisdom
- All material reviewed by aYSC First Nation team for cultural relevancy
- Respect for context of practice

Some pre-course stats:

- 61% of learners indicated a need to learn Best Practice WC
- 14% of learners could identify a critically colonized wound
- 21% of learners knew how to safely treat an arterial ulcer
- 70% primarily used a colleague for information
- 78% of learners conduct consults on difficult to heal wounds









The Results



Able to assess/treat pts more accurately as a result of the course








Education Content Results








Education Delivery Results
