

Chronic Disease Prevention and Management Project Goals

Project Goals:

To gather and analyze information on CDPM models, to develop a toolkit that First Nations communities could use to implement CDPM models, and to disseminate information on recognized models while promoting the toolkit.



Goals of the Toolkit

To identify resources to support the planning of chronic disease prevention and management programs

To provide information on models of care to support CDPM work

To provide resource to support the planning of CDPM programs

Phase 3: Community Visits for Education and Planning Dissemination Strategy



Methodology

Phase 1 : Literature Review

Talked with provincial and regional representatives working with First Nation health

Reviewed National /Regional Frameworks and Strategies for First Nations health

First Nation Organizations : AFN, NAHO, NIICHRO, Diabetes Strategies



Chronic Disease Is an International Concern

Chronic disease has become the major cause of death and disability affecting populations of both developed and developing countries.

59% of the 57,000,000 deaths each year 46% of global burden of disease By 2020, almost <u>75%</u> <u>of all deaths worldwide</u> will be from chronic diseases

- Toolkit : 1) information and 2) inventory of resources to support work of chronic disease




Methodology
