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Core Business

Knowledge synthesis, translation and exchange

- "getting evidence in the hands of decision makers" (practice, program and policy)
- identify gaps in research evidence



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Focus: The social and economic factors that influence the health of Canadians

Mission: Engage public health practitioners, policymakers and researchers to better include knowledge about the social determinants of health in policy and public health practice decisions that will contribute to social justice and health for all




What is home visiting?

- Home visiting is employed to provide personalized and/or intense support to parents and children at risk of negative outcomes over the life course
- Home visiting is distinguished from other early child development programs as an intervention carried out, one to one, in the home with the aim of improving the experience and outcome of a child's early years

Why Focus on Public Health Early Child Home Visiting?

- Environmental scan identified early child home visiting as an established Public Health practice
- Home visiting is widely used in Canada and around the world
- Lack of knowledge about the variety of home visiting programs across Canada
- Communication and collaboration across programs is limited



Why Focus on Public Health Early Child Home Visiting?


- Lack of clarity about the evidence to support the practice of home visiting
- Abundance of studies have evaluated the effectiveness of home visiting with mixed results
- Variation in approach and quality of home visiting programs
 - length, intensity, components, level of training of the home visitor, and target audiences

- Debate and contradiction about the:
 - benefits of home visiting
 - role of public health nurses versus paraprofessionals as home visitors





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Nurturant Environments: TEAM-ECD

Facilitate Knowledge Synthesis, Translation and Exchange (KSTE) around effective strategies for home visiting and the contribution to early child development as a determinant of health





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
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Early Child Development Forum
