What is a Community of Practice?

- A group of people a 'team'
- Come together for a purpose or enterprise
- Create a forum for sharing information
- Share experiences tacit learning
- Develop a set of common practices



Critical Success Factors for Community of Practice

For Community

- A focus that energizes the core group
- A skilful and reputable coordinator
- Involves experts
- Address details of practice
- Has the right rhythm and mix of activities

For Organization

- Strategic relevance of the focus
- Visible management sponsorship, but no micro-management
- Dance of formal and informal structures
- Adequate resources
- Consistent attitude

Examples of Communities of Practice in Ontario

- Barwick: Children's Mental Health
 - MOHLTC funded project to support the introduction of assessment and evaluation tools across Ontario
- Seniors Health Research Transfer Network (SHRTN)
 - 13 CoP e.g.: Activity & Aging; Nursing Best Practices; Seniors with Responsive Behaviours
- Ottawa Regional Cancer Centre
 - Best practices approach to reducing wait times for diagnosis and treatment of cancer

Nursing Example (Scotland)

Tolson et al, 2006:

- Promoting nursing evidence-based practice with older people
 - Created an interactive web site
 - Developed Standards of practice
 - Developed best practices and tested in clinical settings

Key Elements of Community of Practice

(Wenger diagram, top right)

- Define the area of shared enquiry and key issues
- Form relationships and a sense of community

Create the body of knowledge, methods, stories, cases, tools, documents

Initial Experiences-Eastern Ontario

Focusing on chronic disease prevention, management, self-care

Cornwall

- Workshop Jan. 29, meetings Feb., March, April, May
- Participants: total of 10:
 - public health, 2 home care agencies, and 2 community health centres, Community Care Access Centre, education, (7 community health nursing students not included in total)

Ottawa

- Workshop Feb 26, teleconferences March, April, May
- Participants: total of 20:
 - public health, 2 home care agencies, 4 Community Health Centres, Community Care Access Centre

Initial Experiences

- Nunavut- focusing on maternal-child services
 - Workshop Feb 5, teleconferences March, April, May
 - Participants: total of 19 from the 3 regions:
 - community health nurses, home health nurses, public health nurses, education (5 nursing students not included in total)
- Vancouver Coastal Region- support for program on chronic disease self-management
 - Workshop in May, teleconferences will follow
 - Nurses and other health professionals
