	In 2013 the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing (CASN) received funding from the Public Health Agency of Canada to complete a project titled <i>Mobilizing the development and implementation of entry-to-practice public health nursing competencies for undergraduate nursing education</i> . Although other public health competencies have been developed (CHNC, 2009; CNA, 2010), they are not levelled to what can be expected of an entry-level registered nurse. The goal of this project is to define the competencies all nurses must have when they complete a baccalaureate nursing program and to increase faculty's capacity to foster students' integration of these competencies by spotlighting key resources for public health nursing education.
	To identify the competencies CASN created a Task Force of public health experts from nursing education, practice, policy, and other health fields, from across Canada. 201: Continued An environmental scan of public health nursing literature and existing competencies was completed to support the creation of the competencies. Draft competencies were developed and in order to build national consensus, a Forum of 40 stakeholders was convened to review and revise the competencies, followed by a second round of feedback collected using an online survey. The <i>Entry-to-Practice Public Health Nursing Competencies for Undergraduate Nursing Education</i> provide direction for curriculum development in community/public health nursing. Strengthening this content across undergraduate nursing education will prepare all registered nurses to transition into community/public health nursing positions. This workshop will provide attendees with the opportunity to engage in a discussion on methods that faculty can use to foster student integration of the competencies and
	examine the opportunities and challenges that educators will face in attempting to implement the competencies in curricula.
