Food security "all people, at all times, have physical, social, economic access to food which is safe and consumed in sufficient quantity and quality to meet dietary needs and food preferences, and is supported by an environment of adequate sanitation, health services and care, allowing for a healthy and active life" (FAO)

LEARNING FROM PRACTICE: ADVOCACY FOR HEALTH EQUITY - FOOD SECURITY



BACKOROUND

Advacacy is a vital role for public health practitioners in Canada. Engaging in advocacy helps us to build and capitalize on collective action to support systemic change, and offers algoriticant potential to feature the conditions that support greater health equity in sur-communities.¹

There is no single way to design and implement absocacy to address health inequites. Selecting an approach depends on the local or broader context, practitioners' own philosophies or preferences for practice, and the dominant ideology within the organization.
